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The Relationship Between The Jewish Sabbath And The Christian Sunday

"Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God. On it you shall not do any work, neither you, nor your son or daughter, nor your male or female servant, nor your animals, nor any foreigner residing in your towns. For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but he rested on the seventh day. Therefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Exodus 20, 8-11)

One of the most important commandments of the Old Testament was the observance of the Sabbath. On the Sabbath day, God's people were supposed to abstain themselves from the work and labours of human existence and to acknowledge God as their Creator and provider. The Sabbath was a weekly day of rest and worship. It was a holy and special day when God's time and human time would intersect and the chosen people would be reminded of their special covenant with God. It was God himself who blessed and hollowed the seventh day. Therefore the Sabbath was a time consecrated to God and meant to remind to the people of Israel that the entire rhythm of one's life should be guided by God's commandments.

What happened to the institution of the Sabbath in the New Testament and how did the Christians relate to it? We find an answer in Saint Paul's letter to the Colossians: Therefore let no one pass judgment on you in questions of food and drink, or with regard to a festival or a new moon or a Sabbath. These are a shadow of the things that were to come; the reality (the substance of all these) is found in Christ. (Col. 2:16-17). The Old Testament law was just a shadow of the realities that would come and be fulfilled in Christ. This is also true of the Sabbath. The Sabbath is actually fulfilled and surpassed in the Day of the Resurrection. The Day of Christ's Resurrection marks the beginning of a new age in human history. The Resurrection Day is the true seventh day. It is the new Sabbath. This is the chosen and Holy Day first of the Sabbaths, king and lord of days, the feast of feasts,

holy day of holy days. On this day we bless Christ forevermore. (ode 8th, The Canon of Holy Pascha)

The idea of rest was another important element of the Sabbath day. The Sabbath was actually pointing to the true rest that would be brought by the Messianic kingdom. All the healings that Christ performed on the Sabbath day were anticipating the coming of God's kingdom in which all burden, suffering and toil would cease and human beings would finally experience eternal rest in God. The Sabbath rest found its fulfillment in Jesus Christ.

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. (Matthew 11,28-30)

In the ancient pagan world Sunday was the day consecrated to the Sun. In Christianity Sunday would became the day consecrated to the Sun of Righteousness our Lord Jesus Christ as he is described by the prophet Malachi: But unto you that fear my name shall the Sun of righteousness arise with healing in his wings; and ye shall go forth, and grow up as calves of the stall.(Malachi 4:2) Our participation in the Sunday Eucharist is an expression of our life in Christ. It is the participation in his resurrection and a foretaste of our eternal rest with God in his everlasting kingdom.

And on the day called Sunday, all who live in cities or in the country gather together to one place, and the memoirs of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read.... But Sunday is the day on which we all hold our common assembly, because it is the first day on which God ... made the world. And Jesus Christ our Savior rose from the dead on that same day.
